1870 saw the sudden collapse of the Second Empire of France and the ensuing Siege of Paris. The nephew of Napoléon, was a hedonistic authoritarian president. When his term limit was not overturned, he committed a coup d'état to establish himself as Emperor Napoléon III rejecting

democratic principles. A conspirator, he was unlike his famed uncle. He is noted for his behest of the 1855 Classification of Bordeaux. The painting is prophetic as it portrays the Fall of Corinth and is aptly applied to Paris with delusions of imperial grandeur extinguished by invading forces when completed that same year.

# VIRADA

The Second Empire of France was the wellspring for many of France's greatest luminaries in the arts, literature and sciences. Paradoxically, our world was gifted by modern French masters during the ambitious reign of Napoléon III, torn with a litany of conspiracies and insane foreign incursions which ultimately led to his untimely demise. He is often credited with the famous 1855 Classification of Médoc in Bordeaux; critically in 1861, Grand Cru and Premier Cru vineyards in Burgundy were classified as well. His legacy has been afforded far more credit for fine wine than for sage statesmanship. The emperor suffered from an overinflated value of both his military prowess and diplomatic skills coupled with a corrupt regime of insatiable appetites, yet our diadem of Western culture is firmly planted over the panorama of fertile France. Laid at her marbled goddess-like feet which high

culture forever fawns over to lead the way first, France from afar has flooded us with breadth and light from this dazzling epoch.

Coincidentally completed in 1870 by Fantin-Latour, same year as the Fall of the Second Empire as opportune to capture on canvas, as it portrays masters Édouard Manet, Auguste Renoir, Émile Zola, Edmond Maître Frédéric Bazille and Claude Monet at the studio in Les Batignolles. France, forced to abandon imperialism, can instead rely upon her innate strengths in the humanities and sciences, not conquests. When Marianne abandons the heavy anchor of racism from her grasp, she will rise ever higher, desired and admired as her past greats would wish her to be emulated universally as a torch of hope and enlightenment.
